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1. Message from Mrs Barnes



Despite having an EYFS Framework with prime and specific areas to cover, and a National Curriculum that directs the content of what should be taught to children at this stage of their education, we are given the freedom to choose how we feel it is best to deliver the content. We have found that some topics are universally popular with infant aged pupils whilst at other times we take account of particular interests of the children to plan something new. Our teachers work very hard to keep the learning opportunities relevant and interesting for the children so they are motivated and engaged in their learning.

At The John Hampden School Wendover we try hard to present the content as a linked curriculum whenever possible. This means we choose topics which enable aspects of different subjects to be taught in a meaningful way to the children. So, rather than having a history lesson each week we may choose to block the teaching of this subject into a specific topic. At other times we may choose to have specific enrichment days or weeks to focus attention on a particular subject or a particular theme. So far this academic year we have enjoyed a fortnight of Health and Safety. 'Discovery Week' is coming up soon where the children will be investigating mathematically and scientifically. There will also be a focus on thinking skills and links to Growth Mindsets.

When we come back after the half term break, we have planned an exciting Arts Week that will involve the children creating art work linked to a specific theme. This will be enhanced with music and drama. Later on in the year there will also be World Weeks to look forward to.

Whenever possible we invite visitors into school or we plan trips to enhance the learning experiences. Sometimes we ask the children to come to school wearing costumes to make their learning more memorable. With this is mind I would like to draw your attention to World Book Day which we will be celebrating on **Friday 7th March**. Every year we ask the children to dress up and this year we are asking everyone to come dressed as their favourite character from a book. We will be celebrating with a whole week of book related activities and we will let you know more about this in due course but we think it will be great fun!

In the last newsletter we gave details of the Parents' Evenings that are due to take place next week. Please enter the school building via the main entrance where signage will direct you to sit outside the classroom to look at your child's work before you are called in to talk to the teacher. At the end of the 10 minute appointment you will be asked to complete a short questionnaire about your experience and also to complete some feedback for your child to see.

We look forward to seeing you then.

2. GOVERNOR SECTION

Being a John Hampden School Governor is a hugely rewarding role which gives an insight into the significant amount of work that goes on behind the scenes to run our successful infant school. Without doubt the best way to understand more about our school is through school visits. Our visits are definitely not a form of inspection, and are not designed to cause any stress or undue work for the staff! Instead, they are an enjoyable way for us to get to know the school better and for us to understand if what we provide can be improved through any governing board support.

Since September I am fortunate to have been the linked governor to our amazing Out of School Club (OOSC) which is run by the fantastic Sharon Cottle. Far from being a separate facility to the rest of the John Hampden provision, this club is an extended part of the John Hampden experience for all the lucky children who attend the before and after school sessions, and who get to benefit from the provision that the team provide. I visited Sharon last week to see what has changed since my two daughters attended the club (almost 10 years ago now!), and to see for myself what activities and opportunities she provides.

Sharon and the team provide an excellent timetable of play activities for the children to choose from, and these include craft, construction, small world play and role play. I was really impressed to hear that the children are also actively encouraged to use the outdoor play space in all but the very worst weather conditions, and in the Winter months are provided with high-visibility vests and head-torches so they can enjoy their play safely. The fantastic outside space offers no end of opportunities for the children to work off their energy! The staff provide the children with a snack from our recently refurbished kitchen and during my visit it was lovely to see how well behaved the children all were while they enjoyed their beans on toast! However, what I was most impressed with was the fact that there were no children who had chosen to sit in the tv room to either watch tv or play on a computer game. That was incredible to see and a huge reflection on the quality and variety of the play activities that the team put on.

I was therefore not surprised to report back to the governing board this week that our OOSC is being superbly run, is staffed by an amazing team, offers a wide range of activities for our children, and that there is nothing further that Sharon or the team need from the governors. Only from a visit can you really see how much the children enjoy being there, and these visits are one of the highlights of our role as school governors.

3. IMPORTANT MESSAGES

CHILD ILLNESS



At this time of the year we recognise that there are lots of coughs and colds and other illnesses doing the rounds. The last couple of weeks have been quite challenging for the school as we have had a large number of staff off work with ill health. We would ask that if your child has a high temperature, for any reason, that they do not return to school until it is normal again. This way we will all be doing our best to ensure spread of germs and viruses is minimised. Thank you in anticipation of your support.

ONLINE SAFETY



All games released in the UK will have one of the following PEGI age ratings on the packaging: 3, 7, 12, 16 or 18. The rating means that the game shouldn't be played by a young person under that age because there may be content within the game which could potentially be harmful, frightening or worrying to children. As well as an age rating, PEGI also uses icons showing content descriptors, letting you know if a game contains: violence, drugs, bad language, discrimination, fear, gambling, sex, or in-app purchases.

We would urge parents to monitor the games their children are playing, or watching others play, in order to avoid access to unsuitable or upsetting content. Parents/carers should also be aware that within some games children are able to gain access to online content that also may be unsuitable.

Scroll of Honour Badges

Our behaviour initiative, which allows any pupil in the school to be nominated by an adult for demonstrating excellent behaviour, appears to be working well. Every child who is nominated has their name included on the Scroll of Honour and is asked to stand up during 'Over & Above' Assembly on Friday. They are given a yellow 'Spotted for Something Special' badge which they can wear for one week. We are asking for your support in ensuring the badges are returned to school on the following Thursday. This way we can make sure they can be passed to the next set of children who are nominated. We only have a limited supply of the badges and others will be really disappointed if they don't get a badge when it is their special moment. Thank you for your support.



<u>Jewellery</u>

Please remember that children should not be wearing any jewellery to school. Children with pierced ears should definitely have their earrings removed on P.E. days or be provided with tape to cover the studs if they cannot be removed yet. This is for health and safety reasons as earrings can easily get caught up as children get changed for P.E.



DOGS ON THE CAMPUS

This is a polite reminder that no dogs should be brought onto the campus at any time. This is a Health & Safety request.

PARKING ON CAMPUS



This is a polite reminder that parents should not be driving onto the school campus to drop off or pick up children. The campus is for staff only. Please also be courteous to all drivers when driving around the campus roads.

4. CURRICULUM SECTION



Year 2 Wow Day

On Wednesday 29th January, it was so lovely to see so many children come in dressed in costume for our Great Fire of London Day. The children truly immersed themselves into a range of different enrichment activities.

The children tried out some art activities. First they created a silhouette outline of the skyline of London. Then they created an Impasto painting. The children created their own fiery, smoky sky using textured paint (impasto). Finally, they stuck their silhouettes onto their impasto artwork. The children chose realistic colours to depict the fire.

Also, the children got into role and character in Drama and Role Play and acted out scenes from the Great Fire and freeze framed their actions. We then guessed what they were doing! They also performed some music, singing London's Burning as a class and in rounds.

Also, the children were very lucky to make and bake some bread using a recipe from the 17th century. They kneaded the bread and let it prove before baking.

It was a truly superb experience for all the children and staff. Plus, we had a visit from our History Governor, Rachel Coffey, who was very impressed by the children's knowledge and understanding of the Great Fire of London.

In the afternoon, the Great Fire of London activities continued. The children sang London's Burning and The Great Fire of London Rap in Music. They continued researching about the fire in Computing and in Art, the children worked on their sketches of Samuel Pepys. What a super day had by all!

5. PUPIL'S SECTION

Fred: We acted out the scene where we tried to put the fire out using fire hooks and water squirts.

Nathan: I really liked making the bread rolls. In 1666 they used a real oven but now our ovens are electric or gas.





6. SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT

We aim to keep you fully informed of our actions linked to the school improvement plan. Since the last newsletter we have made progress linked to the actions outlined below:

GOAL A: QUALITY OF EDUCATION

SUPERSONIC Phonic Friends

Two years ago we made the decision to purchase a new Phonics Scheme to replace Letters & Sounds at JHSW. We opted for the 'Supersonic Phonic Friends' scheme which utilises a fully systematic synthetic phonic approach. The scheme includes the Firm Foundations in Phonics, The Basics, The Higher Levels ~ Choose to Use Spellings and Switch it Spell Sounds, as well as Key Stage 1 spelling rules. It also ensures children develop passion for reading and the confidence to independently apply each skill when reading and writing.

With new members of staff joining the team this year and more training being delivered, we have recently observed phonics lessons and monitored to ensure there continues to be complete fidelity to the scheme.



We are delighted that two members of staff at JHSW have undertaken training for this science based approach to helping young children to develop resilience and emotional stability.

Details of how the training was organised and detail of what was covered was disseminated to teachers and governors last week. The impact of implementing this approach has already been noted and we look forward to moving forward with this initiative in due course across the school.

GOAL C: PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

Character Education

Schools have a statutory duty, as part of a broad and balanced curriculum, to promote the spiritual, moral, social, and cultural (SMSC) development of pupils and prepare them for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of later life. At JHSW we have audited our provision for this using the six 'Character Education' benchmarks. As part of the audit we are considering how we actively promote good behaviour and positive character traits, including for example courtesy, respect, truthfulness, courage and generosity. We are very aware that schools with clear expectations on behaviour and with well-planned provision for character and personal development can help promote good mental wellbeing.

GOAL D: LEADERSHIP & MANAGEMENT

As we approach the end of the financial year we are waiting for indicative budget figures for 2025-2026. Due to a falling birth rate, pupil numbers were not as strong as usual on census day in October 2024—as most of our funding is derived from this factor we are clear that the financial future of the school continues to be challenging.


