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1. Message from Mrs Barnes

There was virtually 100% attendance at the Learning Review Meetings that took place just before the half-term break and staff have worked hard to catch up with anyone who missed the opportunity to come in and hear about their child's progress. Thank you for your feedback following the meetings, this information has been analysed and fed back to class teachers. At the end of this newsletter you can see the overall feedback percentages from all those who completed a questionnaire. We are obviously very pleased with these findings but have also taken on board the verbal and written feedback that was provided. Keeping to time is clearly the biggest challenge for staff because if everyone has just one minute longer than their allotted time there will inevitably be a consequence for people with later appointments. We apologise if you had to wait beyond your appointment time.

Your continued support is greatly appreciated—our pupils are extremely lucky to have such interested and supportive parents and carers. For our part we try to make the learning opportunities we offer interesting and

engaging. From time to time we enrich the curriculum with visits, visitors and special days or weeks. Book Week, devised by Mrs Parkinson, was a huge success this year and we are so pleased with the continued success of 'The Masked Reader'. Thank you if you engaged with this—we had lots of fun doing it. There is now an additional video 'The Making of the Masked Reader' available on the website. It was also wonderful to be able to continue the tradition of sharing books with pupils from Wendover Junior School. It was a privilege to watch the younger children responding so positively to the support and kindness from the older pupils.



Some of the activities we offer are free of charge and for others we need to request a voluntary contribution. Unfortunately the school is not in a financial position to fund every type of enrichment activity directly from the school budget share so activities can only go ahead if enough people opt to pay. The activities we book are carefully planned to spread the cost over the school year. The **contribution is entirely voluntary** and no child will be disadvantaged if their parents are unable to pay or opt not to pay for some or any of the items. A survey, completed within the last three years told us that parents/carers appreciated a reminder about making payments as some people said that they did forget to do it even though they intended to, so we will continue to do this. The next voluntary contribution will be requested at the start of the summer term.

2. GOVERNOR SECTION

Being a school governor can involve looking at a lot of reports, plans and policies. So, it was a great pleasure when, in February, we had the opportunity to spend an entire day in the school. It was an impeccably planned day (thank you, Mrs Parkinson), where governors were able to meet with teachers, see lessons being taught, look at pupils' work and talk directly with children.

Each of the governors had their own itinerary, but my day began with Year 1 and seeing how they use their different learning environments. I spent most of my time outside where children took part in semi-structured activities, such as maths games, Snakes and Ladders, spelling games, construction, and dress up (among others). I was very impressed by how independent the children were and how well behaved. They were all confident speaking with me and explaining what they were doing.

Later that morning we also had the opportunity to speak with a group of pupils who had met with the school's 'special visitor' (aka the Ofsted inspector) the previous week. As well as telling us about the meeting, they were also able to talk with ease and confidence about the school and its values. They were a very impressive bunch – they must have wowed the inspector.

During lunch I got to witness an entire school being fed and the logistics are incredible but it's a well-oiled machine – very smooth and efficient. The children were – as ever - very well behaved too, and I got to see one of the Year 2 lunchtime helpers in action, supporting younger pupils. It was wonderful to see how pupils take on responsibility and act as such good role models for the others.

Our visit to the school coincided with Arts Week, so in the afternoon governors also had the opportunity to experience Art in practice from Early Years through to Year 2. The theme of Repeating Shapes and Patterns was clearly in evidence and examples of famous artists work (Yayoi Kusama, Damien Hirst, Andy Warhol and William Morris) were used to both demonstrate repeating shapes and patterns but also inspire the children's own work using different techniques which became more complex with age group.

I also met with Clare Dowell, the Nurture Support Co-ordinator in the Nurture Room. This is a very serene space where pupils can come and spend 10 minutes or so, for some time out or a little extra TLC. By taking part in activities, such as painting when I was there, they are very comfortable and relaxed with Clare. I'm afraid I was so absorbed in my conversations with her and the children coming in I completely missed my next appointment...

While I was in the Nurture Room, other governors examined 'Floor Books' (created for each class and illustrated with teacher's annotations and class work). These allow us to be able to see in practice the way the curriculum is followed in several key subjects, across classes and year groups to see how the various elements build upon each other and progress year on year.

At the end of the day each of the governors went to different classrooms for their end of day activities. I was with Ladybirds for a helicopter story where pupils make up a story which the teacher then writes down and pupils act it out as she reads it back to the class. The children showed great imagination and enthusiasm.

While the other governors went home, I paid one last visit to the Out of School Care where I got to spend some time speaking with the staff and seeing how they manage their flourishing after school provision. Another example of a very well organised set up and happy and occupied children

It was a very busy but incredibly rewarding and insightful day. If the teachers will have us back, we'll be doing it again next year.

PROSPECTIVE PARENTS & PUPILS—NURSERY CLASS SEPTEMBER 2024

In September 2024 we will, once again, open the doors of our Early Years Class (Crickets) for a whole new class of children. Our 26 place nursery class runs from a purpose built classroom at the front of the school and has its own outside area. Places for the Crickets Class can be in demand and we only have capacity to take 26 children for the next academic year. Therefore if you have a child born between 1^{st} September 2020 and 31^{st} August 2021 and you are interested in the Early Years Class at John Hampden for September 2024, we would urge you to complete an application form as soon as possible.

We are holding an open morning to view our provision on <u>Saturday 23rd March</u> between 9.30am and 11.00am so do contact the school office if you, or someone you know, is interested in attending. office@jhampden.bucks.sch.uk or 01296 622629

If we fill all 26 places in September with eligible children (admission criteria apply) we are not planning to admit further children after Christmas or after Easter so you may only have one chance to secure a place.

STAFF CAR PARK

Please note, parents are not permitted to park in the staff car park at any time unless there is an agreed arrangement in place. This includes parents/carers whose children make use of our Out of School Care facilities.

A PLEA FROM SCHOOL STAFF!

A reminder that children should not be bringing football stickers, elaborate hair accessories, jewellery or any other toys into school. Such items turn into huge distractions and there is no time in the school day where children are able to 'play' with these things.

Additionally, our cloakrooms are relatively small so we ask that children do not bring bags/backpacks into school as they take up too much space. Your child only needs to bring a book bag.

Throughout the week, Early Years, Foundation Stage, Year 1 and Year 2 were treated to a virtual reading event starring a variety of authors and illustrators which was the focus this year, inspiring children across the school to write and illustrate their own stories.



We had an assembly of Poetry Performances, where every class took it in turns to recite poems that they have learnt so far this year. The day ended with teachers swapping classes to read their favourite stories.

A 'Book Swap' took place in some classes, and the children were delighted to take home some new reading material. Thank you for your kind donations.

On Thursday, Wendover Pre-School joined Foundation Stage to watch an online presentation from the author, Guilherme Karsten, who wrote 'Are you a Monster?'

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7. SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT

We aim to keep you fully informed of our actions linked to the school improvement plan. Since the last newsletter we have made progress linked to the actions outlined below:

GOAL A: QUALITY OF EDUCATION



It has been really encouraging to see how well our pupils are responding to the different themes and topics that have been introduced during the year. We have worked hard to try to cover numerous curriculum areas within a topic and the quality of learning appears to have improved considerably as a result. We are very aware that the teaching and learning environment contributes enormously to effective learning and we are working hard to ensure our outside learning areas reflect a similar high quality to that provided indoors. The EYFS Framework and the National Curriculum guide the content of the taught curriculum but the spiritual, moral, social and cultural aspects of learning also feature strongly in the curriculum to reinforce the ethos of our school.

GOAL B: BEHAVIOUR & ATTITUDES



The Behaviour Expectations and the School Values underpin the behaviour policy at John Hampden they are displayed in every area in the school and regularly referred to, so our pupils are very clear about our expectations. However, our children are only young and their education at our school involves them being taught social skills as well as academic skills. Just as our pupils are at different stages with their academic development, they are at different stages with their social development too. To accommodate this there are a huge range of interventions and support offered to those that need more help to make the right behaviour choices. This type of support is on-going and regularly monitored and evaluated by all staff to try to ensure that everyone can learn well. At the recent learning review meetings teachers covered any issues linked to behaviour as part of their discussions.

GOAL C: PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

Feedback from the recent Learning Review Meetings has been positive in terms of the satisfaction levels linked to information provided by the school. Developing confidence and self esteem is crucial in the early years and children need to be recognised for their strengths as well as being supported in developing resilience and positive attitudes when faced with new challenges.

The continued focus on developing positive attitudes to learning and encouraging a growth mindset is reflected in the day to day observations of pupils and staff at John Hampden.



GOAL D: LEADERSHIP & MANAGEMENT

Each teacher in the school takes responsibility for a specific curriculum area. During the term governors may come into school to observe a specific event linked to their subject area or they meet with the teacher to discuss how the subject is being taught, assessed or developed. At the end of each term subject leaders are required to review the actions they have taken during the term and the impact these actions have had. The governor section of the newsletter often provides an example of this in practice and it is clear that this type of liaison is mutually beneficial and also helps to maintain standards in the school.

<u>Press Release from Buckinghamshire Council</u> 'Respect Me' says Buckinghamshire's School Crossing Patrollers

Buckinghamshire Council is calling on all drivers to be respectful of the work carried out by the county's dedicated group of school crossing patrollers. More commonly known as lollipop men and women, Buckinghamshire's 60 school crossing patrollers are out, come rain or shine, morning and afternoon during school term time with their trusty STOP signs, helping children and families to reach school safely. Most drivers are respectful and stop when requested, however, a small minority can be abusive and put lives at risk with dangerous manoeuvres because they don't want to stop to let people cross safely. Examples include drivers using abusive language, not stopping when the patroller is already standing in the road and swerving around patrollers to get past. Patrollers' jobs are also made more difficult by drivers blocking pavements and stopping or parking in inconsiderate places to drop of children, particularly at School Keep Clear markings and bus stops.

One of the school crossing patrollers working in Aylesbury commented: "It is noticeable how some people speed up as they're coming towards you, trying to get past. We're not here to stop people for the fun of it, we're here to protect the children." Buckinghamshire Council has relaunched its 'Respect Me' campaign to remind drivers to be more considerate and respectful of the valuable job school crossing patrollers do. Steven Broadbent, Cabinet Member for Transport at Buckinghamshire Council, said: "Our lollipop men and women are valuable members of our local school communities and are well-loved and appreciated by the pupils and parents they help. "We know that the majority of drivers are considerate, but it seems that a minority are choosing to ignore the Highway Code and could be putting lives in danger. We will always have a zero-tolerance approach to behaviour which threatens the physical or mental wellbeing of our crossing patroller staff or which compromises the safety of those crossing the road. "We hope that communities will continue to support their local patrollers to do their job safely. We need drivers to be patient and considerate – after all it's only asking for a few seconds to ensure everyone crosses safely." Drivers must stop when they are shown the STOP 'lollipop' sign; failing to do so when requested can lead to a £1,000 fine, three penalty points and disqualification. Vehicles must also remain stationary until the pole has been lowered and the patroller is back on the pavement. 
