1. Message from Mrs Barnes



I hope you found the meetings with teachers useful last week. We deliberately organise them to be early in the term because, from our perspective, we find it extremely valuable to be able to share our observations about how your children have settled into their new classes. For children in Caterpillars Class we will rearrange your meetings A.S.A.P.

We have now reached the final day of the first half term and I think everyone is well and truly ready for a week off, when we can recharge our batteries and prepare for the very busy and exciting next half of the Autumn term. During the last seven weeks there has been staff and pupil absence due to sickness, high temperatures and coughs and colds. Additionally, Covid has not completely gone away so we continue to put in place protective measures to keep our school community as safe as possible. These include:



- Keeping occupied spaces well ventilated
- Regularly promoting good hygiene including hand washing and covering the nose and mouth when coughing/sneezing.
- Regular hand sanitising
- Requesting that those suffering from sickness/diarrhoea do not attend school for 48 hours following the last bout of illness
- Requesting children are collected as quickly as possible if they are unwell whilst at school

On Monday 9th October we held two of our 'Open Morning' sessions for prospective parents. In total about 45 families visited the school and were given a short presentation which included contributions from pupils followed by a guided tour of the school. Feedback from the event was very positive and it was lovely to be able to show off our school in such a positive way.

Another two sessions are planned for Tuesday 14th November. If you, or anyone you know, is looking for Nursery or Reception school places for September 2024 do phone the school office and book one of the remaining times to view the school.

May I take this opportunity to wish you a good half term break and we look forward to seeing you back in school for another action packed half term when we return to school on Monday 30th October.

2. GOVERNOR SECTION

Dear Parents and Carers

As part of my role as link Governor for Science, I recently had a catchup meeting with Miss Tiffin, the school's co-ordinator for Science. In addition to her role as class teacher, it is Miss Tiffin's responsibility to ensure policies, visions, actions plans etc. for Science are in sync with the National Curriculum and are implemented effectively and consistently throughout the school.



If your child attended the school last year, you may remember my newsletter piece from last February, in which I mentioned that the school had embarked on gaining the Primary Science Quality Mark. This is a National scheme that is designed to provide structure to the development of a quality science provision within schools, supported by a wide variety of exciting resources, as well as training and mentoring for teachers and science leaders. I am extremely pleased to be able to announce that John Hampden has been awarded the Primary Science Bronze Mark. This is an amazing achievement and one that is only possible in schools that understand the importance of providing pupils with an impassioned understanding of the world around them. During my recent visit, Miss Tiffin talked me though her submission for the PSQM. Based on the volume, detail, quality and above all, passion, that had obviously gone into preparing this documentation, I can confidently say the Bronze Mark was well deserved. I would therefore like to take this opportunity to say a huge 'Well done' and 'thank you' to Miss Tiffin for this amazing accomplishment.

I am very much looking forward to visiting the school again next term during Science Week. Last years activities included a visit from 'Sublime Science', an organisation who specialise in bring science to life for school aged children. This included exciting demonstrations and activities involving smoke, bubbles, springs and everyone's favourite.... slime. Sublime Science will hopefully be back in the Spring for more science based (educational) fun and I've booked my visit!

Talking of visiting the school.... Miss Tiffin has a request to any parents who work in a scientific role. We are looking for a small number of parents who could come into school and give a short presentation to pupils, to show how science is relevant to the wider world. This could be someone from the medical field, such as a nurse who gives vaccinations, an ecologist who carries out bat surveys, someone working for quality control in a cake factory (as long as they bring and share), or even just an astronaut....

Both teacher led lessons and externally provided sessions are essential to enable our children to become independent thinkers, who can use their scientific knowledge to make informed conclusions about the ever changing world around them. So, if you could spare 15 minutes to enthuse some of our budding John Hampden scientists, please get in touch with the school office.

So, all in all, an amazing amount of progress has been made since by last visit. I can confidently say that there continues to be a clear intent within the school to inspire the children, nurturing their enthusiasm for science, so that they will continue with their scientific learning and hopefully encourage them to become scientists of the future.

3. IMPORTANT MESSAGES

Applying for Primary School Places (new EYFS cohort and Year 2 moving to Junior School)

If your child is due to start infant or junior school in September 2024 now is the time to start thinking about your application. If you live in Buckinghamshire visit the council's <u>website</u> between 01 November 2023 and 15 January 2024 to apply for a place for your child online.

Voluntary Contributions

Many thanks to all parents who have chosen to pay the voluntary contribution this term. We have sent out reminders, just in case anyone who intended to pay had forgotten to do so.

<u>Clothing</u>, <u>Coats</u> and <u>Lost</u> Property

As the colder weather approaches please make sure your children bring a named, warm coat to school everyday. Please could you also check that your child's clothing has the correct name in it. For example, sometimes children wear clothing that has belonged to an older sibling and if the siblings name is still in the clothing there can be confusion if there is another child in the class with that name.

Staff Car Park

Parents must not use the staff car park at any time. Please park on the campus and walk onto the grounds to collect from OOSC.

Lunch Choices

Please note that you need to order by midnight on a Tuesday for your child to receive the hot meal two weeks later. This means that if you did not order meals by the deadline of 17th October you will need to provide your child with a packed lunch for the first week following the half-term break. You need to order by midnight on 24th October for your child's meals to start on 6-11-23. We are noticing that a number of children are unhappy with the food choices that have been made for them. Please could we ask that you discuss the meal options with them before ordering so they understand and agree the choices that you make for them.

4. CURRICULUM



Earlier this month, some of the children from Year Two and their families attended one of two workshops about bats. These special events took place in the school grounds and were led by Dr Hooper who is a bat specialist, with the amazing support of her son, Sam.

During the summer, Dr Hooper conducted a bat survey and discovered that there are a variety of different types of bats in residence in the school's outdoor spaces. This is largely due to the fact that we are positioned close to the canal and because this space usually remains undisturbed during the evenings. It is likely that the same bat families frequent this area each year which is wonderful news as it means that our grounds and the plants that grow here are a suitable habitat for them to thrive.

The children and their families enjoyed listening to a fascinating talk about the different types of bats from around the world with photos and props to support. They were told the names of the particular varieties that make their home at John Hampden School! Namely, the noctule, the pipistrelle and the soprano pipistrelle. The children then learned how to use the bat detectors that Dr Hooper kindly provided and once set to the correct frequency, used them to go in search of bats. They were thrilled to locate some bats for themselves and once the sun had set, they were absolutely delighted to see some flying about!













The evenings were thoroughly enjoyed by all but also provided useful information from the results of the surveys that the children completed. This will help build a picture of the bat life that we have here. Some families have since reported that they have purchased bat detectors of their own and that the experience has led their children to become even more interested in nature, which is fantastic to hear! Sincere thanks to Dr Hooper and Sam for delivering such a wonderfully informative talk, providing all who attended with such a magical evening! Many thanks to the staff who helped Mrs Spencer to facilitate the evenings.

5. PUPIL'S SECTION

Here are the comments from some of the children who attended the bat evenings.



George thought it was a really fun evening and he got the chance to see lots of

bats. He liked using the bat detectors to hear where the bats were.

During the bat evening, Leo learnt that some types of bat like open

space, some

like trees and others prefer water. They send signals so they don't bump into things in the dark.



Nilou enjoyed being at school at night! It was really fun because we got the chance to

see the bats as it started to get dark. We had hot chocolate and bat (shaped) biscuits.

We saw some pipistrelle bats down by the canal. They are only the size of a thumb! The bats made a clicking sound according to Jago who heard them while using the bat detector. He used the detector to spot some (soprano) pipistrelle bats by the hall and found some near the playground.



Frankie liked using the bat detectors and found out that in our country there's a bat the size of an adult thumb.

Some bats flew closer to the fence and George said that one went really near him. He liked the hot chocolate and bat biscuits too.
