1. MESSAGE FROM MRS BARNES

In an infant school, at the beginning of a new school year, I think it is particularly important for the children to be given time to settle into their new classes, getting to know their new teachers and teaching assistants. We have spent time in the first few weeks focusing on our 'Behaviour Expectations' and reinforcing our core values so that all pupils are fully aware of the things that are important to our school community. I regularly visit the classes during the working day and it is very encouraging to watch the children adjusting to the routines and expectations of school life. We aim to have a positive approach to behaviour management, and our behaviour expectations highlight what children should do, rather than what they should not! In each class, we have a 'Recognition Board' where children's names are written immediately we spot them doing something particularly impressive. We believe it is important to acknowledge when children do well and at John Hampden, this is done in a variety of ways. Feedback from teaching staff is the most immediate method, but stickers and pebbles are also used as reward tokens in many of the classes. Children are sent to me or Mrs Parkinson to share their learning when they have done exceptionally well and we reward this behaviour with special stickers and a gold star to take home. Each Friday we are holding our 'Over & Above' assembly, in which children from each class are chosen to receive a special certificate and sticker. This is awarded by the class teachers and teaching assistants for exceptional behaviour or exceptional learning. Children receiving the 'Over & Above' certificates are invited to sit on special chairs and a star is put onto our display board in the hall to remind us of their achievements.

A silver cup is awarded to the 'Class of the Week'. So far Firecrests, Caterpillars and Hedgehogs have won the cup - I'll leave your children to tell you who won it today!

Finally, 'The Scroll of Honour' is unfurled. The scroll contains the names of any child in the school who has been spotted by any adult for doing something special. The children are asked to stand and the whole school sing a congratulatory song to them. Each child whose name is on the scroll will bring home a special certificate so you know what they have done to impress us. They will also be given a yellow badge to wear on their jumper during the following week.

We also like to celebrate achievement outside school and we have a display board in the corridor to showcase the talents of our pupils. If your child is awarded a certificate or an award for swimming, dancing, sport, music etc. we are happy to take a photocopy or photograph and put it up on the board.

We are looking forward to our upcoming Parents' Evenings where we can provide you with feedback about how your child is settling into their new class. From our perspective it appears the online system for making appointments has worked successfully. **All Crickets Class parents will be invited to enter the classroom via the drop off/exit door. For the rest of the school, parents should enter via the main front door and you will be directed to a seating area outside your child's classroom to wait.** Please remember that your appointment only lasts for 10 minutes—if it appears that you require more time, a new meeting will need to be organized as others are delayed if your appointment overruns. If, following your meeting, you would like to speak to me or Mrs Parkinson about any matter please come to the main entrance where we can arrange a mutually convenient time and place to speak.

2. GOVERNOR SECTION

Following Ben Gattlin's introduction to the governors in the last newsletter, I wanted to introduce myself to new parents as one of the elected parent governors for John Hampden. My son has just started this year in Foundation Stage (Caterpillars) and my daughter, who first joined JHS in Crickets, finished Year 2 (Red Kites) last summer.

I've found being a parent governor a great way to get to know the school better, and get a bit more understanding of how young children learn and how positive values are taught – since, like most 4 year olds I expect, as we walk away from the school gate, it's difficult to understand from my son exactly what he's been doing all day! As parent governors, we aren't there to speak 'on behalf' of all parents, but rather to bring a parent's perspective to the decisions that the governors make for the school.

Like a lot of Foundation Stage, I'm sure, my son has found the busyness and excitement of starting a new school very tiring. But it's been wonderful to see how the fabulous staff team have made them feel settled so quickly – from using robot arms for phonics, to developing good meal-time manners, to getting on with new friends, to learning the school values and behaviour expectations.

It was a particular highlight for me last week to join the wonderful Harvest Festival. It was hard to believe that the Foundation Stage children had only been in 'big school' for three weeks – they sat beautifully, sang joyfully and did their actions so confidently. They were an absolute credit to Mrs Barnes, Mrs Parkinson and all the teachers and TAs, and I hope very proud of themselves as well.

COATS

Children are involved in learning outside the classroom everyday so it is really important that they bring a named coat to school everyday especially as it is starting to get a little colder and wetter now. Also, could you check that your child has their own name in their belongings. Sometimes children wear pre-owned uniform that has a previous pupils name in it—and obviously that can cause confusion!

REMINDER

4. CURRICULUM



How can you support Growth Mindset at home?

One of the best ways you can model a growth mindset is to speak about mistakes you've made, and what you've learned from them. Speak positively about your mistakes and struggles, and this will show your children that taking risks and making mistakes are a natural part of the learning process. Explain to your children that trying hard things is what helps us grow, and you can't be perfect when you try something hard!

The way we praise our children can have a profound impact on their mindset. Research on praise and mindsets shows that when we praise children for being 'good' or 'clever', it promotes a fixed mindset. It sends a message that their accomplishments are trait-based, and tied to something innate. In contrast, praising children for the effort involved promotes a growth mindset. It sends a message that the child's effort is what led them to success.

You can encourage this at home, rather than praise the outcome, make the praise specific, for example.....

Instead of saying....	Try saying.....
I love your picture	Wow, I can see you've worked hard to keep the colouring inside the lines
Great reading	Well done for using your phonics to help you sound out that difficult word
Good girl/Good boy (This is a very vague statement for children as they often don't know why they are 'good')	I'm really pleased with the effort you put into.... I'm really happy that you did..... it shows me how hard you've tried
That's not right	You've worked hard to spell that word, keep trying as you are nearly there!
I'll do it for you	Let's try together because if we keep trying we'll get better
Great work, you're really clever	Great work, you put a lot of effort into doing that so well
Well done for getting all your spellings right	Well done for working hard to learn all those spellings. I can see how much effort you made and it paid off

5. PUPIL'S SECTION



7. SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT



Long Term Strategic Aims

- To consistently provide high quality education within an enabling environment (re-gain an Ofsted 'Outstanding' grading)
- To ensure a safe and secure environment for all
- To develop and maintain effective relationships with all stakeholders
- To recover financially from a deficit position
- To collaborate more effectively through the development of a soft federation with other liaison group schools
- To expand the school to four forms of entry
- To facilitate an effective succession strategy for key roles within the school

The leadership team at the school, which includes the Full Governing Board, has agreed the long term strategic aims for the school. They are as follows:

Each year we review and use these strategic aims to underpin an annual School Development Plan where we identify key targets and success criteria within four 'Goals'. The goals link to the Ofsted Inspection Framework:

Goal A: Quality of Education—including targets linked to curriculum intent, implementation and impact

Goal B: Behaviour and Attitudes—including behaviour; attitudes to learning; attendance and punctuality

Goal C: Personal Development—including pupil voice; equalities and diversity; personal, social and health education; extra-curricular activities; support for learning

Goal D: Leadership & Management—including collaboration arrangements; deficit recovery; professional development for staff; safeguarding; managing workload

The annual School Development Plan 2023-2024 will be available on the school website and each fortnight you will receive an update on our progress towards meeting the targets in the plan in this newsletter.
