It was also an opportunity to see many mini beasts nestling amongst the plants such as caterpillars, wood lice and worms. The children also had the chance to apply their knowledge from health week to identify the fruit and vegetables growing in abundance in the allotment area. Mr Duggan gave a powerful and engaging speech about climate change and how we can all do many things to protect the planet starting with recycling. A massive thank you to Mr and Mrs Duggan for allowing us to visit their beautiful garden!

Here is a breakdown of some of the support available in Bucks over the summer:

**Southcourt Family Centre Plus** – a drop in for parents and young people to access support (can include food parcels, financial support, parenting advice, signposting to mental/ physical health support services, etc). <u>Southcourt Family Centre Plus (Aylesbury) | Family Information Service</u>

**Youth and Family Open Days** – Fun and Free activities for children, young people and families across a number of Family Hub centres. Information will be added to our Facebook pages which parents can sign up to <u>AylesburyFamilyHubTeam Lnk.Bio</u>

**Qwell** – mental health support for adults aged 18+. The service allows people aged 18+ to utilise free self-help support via discussion boards, articles, podcasts, a journal space and goal setting tools - <u>Qwell - Explore Kooth</u>

**Family Learning** – A variety of fun free sessions families can attend with their children. Session sign up for Autumn has also just been opened - <u>Family Learning - Buckingham</u>-<u>shire Adult Learning</u>

**Alternatives to Conflict** - Alternatives to Conflict work with people experiencing a wide range of different conflict challenges, including parent to child, parent to parent, parent and teacher, neighbour conflict, wider family conflict as well as young person to young person (peer conflict) - <u>Home - Alternatives to Conflict</u>

**Universal stay and play sessions** (for children aged 0 - 5. Siblings aged up to 10 can also attend during the holidays). There are a variety of sessions run from family centres across the county.
