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1. Message from Mrs Barnes

I hope you managed to have a restful half term break and were able to enjoy some quality time with your children.

The pupils at John Hampden have had two enrichment weeks recently—Discovery Week just before the half term break and Arts week last week. Further information about the activities that took place during these special weeks can be found later in this newsletter and on the school website.



Last week a travelling book fair visited the school in preparation for World Book Week which has taken place this week—thank you for your support. During Book Week there has been a focus on books, reading and performance. Pupils have accessed online presentations from famous authors, shared poetry recitals with other classes as well as enjoying other story telling activities where teachers swapped classes and read stories to a new class of children. Today our World Book Day celebration event has involved our pupils sharing books with pupils from Wendover Junior School. We have really enjoyed

seeing all the children and staff wearing their book character costumes and we will include some photos on the school website.

During the week, I hope you have enjoyed the performances from mystery readers in our 'Masked Reader' competition, accessed via the school website. The reveals will take place during assembly today but you too



will be able to see who's behind the mask as the reveal videos will be uploaded to the school website. We hope as many families as possible have entered the competition to win a book token by guessing—winners will be announced shortly. Huge thanks to exgovernor, Toby Short, for helping with the filming and for preparing the videos you will see...... and to the staff who took part.

2. GOVERNOR SECTION

It was Arts Week at the school last week and as the Art Link Governor I spent a little time there taking a look at what the children have been doing and talking with Mrs Barnes about the Art curriculum and Lesson Plans. As someone who returned to art a bit later in life, I was delighted to see what the school is doing to build creativity with young children and enable them to develop skills.

As Mrs Barnes told me while we were walking around several classrooms at the end of the day, and I paraphrase, 'even if someone can't draw well, if they can make marks and use colours then they can create something they will feel pleased with.' That is so true and new ideas do follow each success.

The school enables the children to learn different techniques such as printing using found objects as well as dabbing sponges, brushes and the like; overlaying colours and mixing them; designing, making and using their own print block with string on small panels and a paint roller really enables creativity, discovery and the development of skills. Seeing how these are extended from year group to year group from Early Years Foundation Stage right through to Year 2 and even include items in the outside areas is wonderful. There really is a golden thread of learning running all through the Art curriculum across the whole school.

As in previous years, works by famous artists are introduced as creative stimuli. The children use the techniques and skills they have learned to create their own versions. Some of their pictures were done from scratch while others used outlines of the original. This year they are, 'Spots' by Damien Hirst and 'The Great Wave,' a famous print by Katsushika Hokusai. I had seen the picture before, and you probably have, but I did not know the artist at all. This links beautifully with the Arts Week theme of The Sea and also provides an opportunity to introduce the fact that Hokusai was born in Japan in 1760 and tell a little about his work as a woodblock cutter and artist and that many of his landscapes feature Mount Fuji, as does 'The Great Wave'.







Beyond painting, Arts Week has also featured Perform Drama Workshops; music with a sea theme; and, across other subjects, there were links to looking after the environment which emphasised sea pollution.

It has been great to see so much creativity and see first-hand the results of the hard work and commitment of the John Hampden School Wendover staff. I hope they all continue to enjoy and gain from all the arts.

3. IMPORTANT MESSAGES

HOMEWORK

Children in Year 1 and Year 2 are receiving regular homework. Tasks are explained to the children at school but it would be useful if parents could also reinforce the task and support children to produce work of an acceptable quality. At school, the children are used to high expectations in terms of presentation and effort and we would ask that homework is always completed to these same high standards. It is important that our pupils get into good habits now, as homework will be a regular feature of their educational lives.

SCHOOL UNIFORM

We ask all parents who send their children to our school for their support of the school uniform policy. We believe that parents have a duty to send their children to school correctly dressed and ready for their daily schoolwork (including a named P.E. kit). Parents should ensure that their child has the correct uniform, and that it is clean, <u>named</u> and in good repair. We currently have Lost Property boxes that are over flowing with clothing that is not named—children are not able to identify whether it is theirs or not!

The Uniform Policy and an order form is available on our school website and gives clear guidance about appropriate clothing for school. Many items can be purchased from the school office.

We wish to discourage parents from allowing their children to wear 'jean' type trousers and we prefer children to wear school type shoes or boots in black, grey or navy.

If any parent would like the school to modify the uniform policy, they should make representation, in the first instance, to the head teacher. The school welcomes children from all backgrounds and faith communities. If there are serious reasons, for example religious objections, why parents want their child to wear clothes that differ from the school uniform the school will look sympathetically at such requests. Similarly, should an item of school uniform prove problematic for a pupil with disabilities then parents are invited to draw this to the attention of the head teacher. The school will not treat pupils with disabilities unfavourably.

Our policy is based on the notion that a school uniform:

- promotes a sense of pride in the school;
- engenders a feeling of community and belonging;
- is practical and smart;
- identifies the children with the school;
- is not distracting in class (as fashion clothes might be);
- makes children feel equal to their peers in terms of appearance;
- is regarded as suitable, and good value for money, by most parents;
- has been designed with health and safety in mind.

COATS

Children should wear a coat to school every day at this time of the year.

SCHOOL WEBSITE

School websites are an important way of finding out about a school. There is a great deal of statutory information that should be included on a school site but we continue to work hard to try and ensure that ours also gives a true flavour of what the school is really like. I would urge you to take a regular look as new information/detail is often added. 4. Curriculum—ARTS WEEK

Arts Week is an opportunity for us to highlight and focus on the arts. On Tuesday 25th February, each class took part in a free Perform drama workshop with the theme of 'Deep Sea Adventure'. They were then introduced to the theme for the art work focus— 'Printing with Repeating Shapes and Patterns' - with a sea theme alongside consideration for the environmental issue of sea pollution. This was delivered through an emphasis on a variety of printing techniques and an introduction to two famous artists.


Katsushika Hokusai

Famous artwork by the two artists was studied and printing techniques were applied to the work of our pupils.

We were really impressed to see how engaged the children were in the art activities and to watch their creativity shining through. They were encouraged to explore printing—finger printing, sponge printing, fruit and vegetable printing, string printing and press printing.

We thought you might like to read some comments from the children about what they enjoyed during Arts Week.




Eliza liked dabbling with her fingers.

Pupil Voice:

During Discovery week Key Stage 1 children enjoyed using their mathematical skills to reason and solve.

In Year 1 they investigated 2D shapes and tessellation.

Hughie: I used triangles to make a diamond shape. It's cool making new shapes.

Neve: I used two squares to make a rectangle. I like learning new things like tessellation.

Nate: I like that I tried to make my shapes like a cats head.

Sophie: I like that I could put my shapes together to make a big rectangle.

In Year 2 they investigated Data Handling.

Theo: I learned that using a tally is a quicker way of recording how many (there are) of something.

Toby: I found out that in a bar chart you need to draw the squares and not just the number. It makes the information easier to read.

Morrie: I loved turning the tally chart into a block chart so we could see the results clearly.

Joshua: It was fun looking at the block chart and answering questions.

Arlo: I enjoyed making my own tally chart and asking the class what their favourite sport was.

Heidi: I liked answering questions based on the data I had collected.

On Monday, Year 1 children entered their classrooms to find a GIANT had visited! They looked carefully at the clues they found to work out who had been in their classrooms. They found giant footprints, leaves, magic beans, gold coins and golden eggs. Using the clues, we decided it was the giant from Jack and the beanstalk. We met the giant (who was actually quite friendly) and after asking him some questions, realised he was looking for Jack! The children asked the giant questions and then created descriptions about his appearance and personality.

7. SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT

We aim to keep you fully informed of our actions linked to the school improvement plan. Since the last newsletter we have made progress linked to the actions outlined below:

GOAL A: QUALITY OF EDUCATION

Education at John Hampden is about inspiring and motivating our pupils. Arts week is an enrichment opportunity to allow our pupils to experience live drama, art and music in order to meet one of our curriculum aims 'to open up to possibility'.

Arts Week was preceded by Discovery Week where there was a focus on Science, Maths and Thinking skills. World Book Week has been planned to focus on developing a love of reading and a joy of books including non-fiction and poetry. It also aims to give pupils further opportunities to recite poetry, dress up and engage with 'The Masked Reader'.



GOAL C: PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

Completion of the online audit is well underway for JHSW to gain the Healthy Schools accreditation. Mrs Spencer has taken the lead and has been working with other subject leaders in the school to ensure our self-evaluation is reflective of all the good work that is being done.

We have also added several more photographs of children who have received trophies, medals or certificates for their success in activities outside school. These photos are displayed within school on our 'Wall of Fame'.



GOAL B: BEHAVIOUR & ATTITUDES

Arts Week and Book Week have given us another opportunity for our classes to share their learning. They enjoyed seeing the art work that was created by the other year groups in our 'Over & Above' assembly.

We regularly ask our KS1 pupils to volunteer for monitor roles in the school. Tasks include monitors for the dining hall, monitors to ensure the reading books and the school library books are kept organised and tidy, monitors to check playground equipment etc. There are always lots of monitor jobs in the classrooms too, as we believe in ensuring as many children as possible get the chance to take on roles of responsibility within the school.



GOAL D: LEADERSHIP & MANAGEMENT

Whenever possible we are keen to collaborate with our local liaison group of schools. This involves teaching staff working together. For example, organising events such as pupils at JHSW sharing books with pupils from WJS during our World Book Day celebrations.



The provisional budget for 2025-206 was set and agreed by governors last week. School finances continue to be very challenging.
